We cannot stress enough the importance of breastfeeding your baby or pumping breast milk and leaving it with the nurses. This is one of the main ways in which you can help your baby.

**The Real Deal on Breast-**

feeding: Breastfeeding is not as easy as it looks! Breastfeeding takes some training and the help of a **Lactation Consultant** in the NICU, so don't be afraid to ask for help.

Pumping Breast Milk:

Pumping breast milk is another great way to help your baby, especially prior to attempting breastfeeding and beyond. Ask a **Lactation Consultant** to teach you how to use the breast pump in the hospital and, if possible, how to rent one. Hospital-grade pumps are the best.

After the NICU: *Researching Feeding Clinics*

Preemies sometimes need help with feeding issues beyond the NICU days. Feeding clinics can be helpful and here are some questions you should ask:

- Is your program sensory based or behaviorally-based (i.e. force feeding)? One on one or group?
- What types of tools do you use in your program?
- What types of therapeutic approaches do you use?
- What is your success rate with premature infants on a feeding tube? Not on a feeding tube?
- How does your clinic define "success"?
- Do you take insurance and/or Medicaid?
- Ask for 3 references of successful "graduates" from their program.

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Q&A with Esther A.L. Verbovsky M.A. CCC-SLP: Feeding Programs

Q: *What types of feeding clinics are available?*

A: There are different programs depending on who you go to – a psychologist, a speech therapist, an occupational therapist or even a behavioral specialist. Some are one-on-one while others are group-based. Depending on the issues at hand it can be a sensory-based program with a behavioral component or one that is more intense and hospital-based (the hospital does all feedings).

Q: *What programs do you find most successful?*

A: I find that the the sensory-based programs for children that are on the autism spectrum works best. The force-feeding programs may work for some but

not for others. It is a matter of figuring out your child's individual needs and matching that with the right type of program. That is why there are so many types of feeding programs out there.

Q: *What do you recommend to a family researching a feeding program for their child?*

A: Know your child and what type of setting he/she best thrives. Also ask a lot of questions and request references. Talk to other parents in support groups for suggestions as well.
