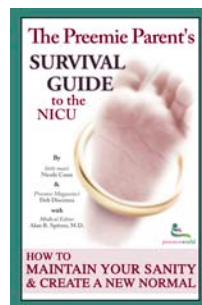

Term: Muscle Tone Definitions

Hypertonia: High or tight muscle tone. It is quite common for infants on ventilators to exhibit tight muscle tone, as it is very hard on their little bodies to be stuck in a certain position endlessly. If untreated, this can lead to dysfunction of the muscle or deformity. Ask your doctors or nurses for an occupational therapy consultation.



Hypotonia: Commonly referred to as “floppy,” means low muscle tone. This may occasionally be a sign of early cerebral palsy and is treated with physical therapy. In many babies, however, it may be only a reflection of the fact that they are very ill and it will improve over time.

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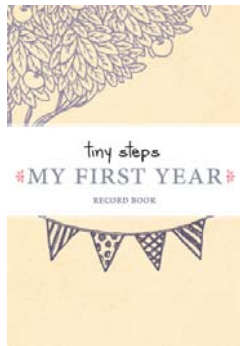

After the NICU: Early Intervention is Key

Premies, whether 23 weeks or 33 weeks, the research is clear that the earlier you identify and address delays, the better the outcome. Why?

- Your baby lost time in the womb and spent that time in an incubator or hospital crib.
- Your baby may have medical or developmental diagnoses that could affect development and the sooner these are addressed, the better he/she will do in the long-term.
- Early Intervention can give you extra needed developmental support that your pediatrician cannot.

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Preemie Parent Words: *Parent Instinct Pays Off*

Deb Discenza *gives insight into the winding trail of getting answers developmentally and more.*

I had doctors and nurses crowing at my daughter Becky's strength and resilience in the NICU. "She's doing great," they said. *I believed them.* Even through our rollercoaster ride, Becky was strong. At discharge, the NICU OT told me, "There will be delays but she's doing well." *I believed her, too.*

But at home, as I was sifted through the paperwork and made appointments, my gut instinct told me otherwise. *Something is not right.* So I signed Becky up a monitoring through our local Health Department and the NICU's follow-up clinic. Within months the teams

now talked about ways to help with the increasing delays. But otherwise, I was told, she was doing well. *Something is not right* - this mental mantra continued inside me. Fast forward to Becky at 18 months old and qualifying for Early Intervention: it dawned on me that *I was the expert of my child.* So I spoke up, I took my daughter to specialists and therapists and more. By 12 years old we addressed developmental diagnoses from autism, to ADHD, to feeding issues, sensory issues to motor coordination issues to very mild Cerebral Palsy. She is doing well - *now.* *Trust your preemie parent instinct.*
